






Graphic material, BACCHUS Laurier Collection, ca. 1997.









SEARCHING FOR ARCHIVAL RECORDS

- Search terms
- Outdated and harmful language
- Guiding questions to identify potential sources:
 - O What information would support my hypothesis or answer my research question?
 - O What materials or documents would contain this information?
 - Who would create these materials or documents?
 - What archives would have these materials or documents?

SEARCHING FOR ARCHIVAL RECORDS: EXAMPLE

- Research question
 - O What advocacy activities did grassroot environmental groups participate in in Northern Canada?
- What information would support this research question?
 - o Documents created by grassroot environmental groups.
- What material or documents would contain this information?
 - o Meeting minutes, newsletters, and press releases.
- Who would create this material?
 - o Canadian Arctic Resource Committee.
- What archives have these materials?
 - Laurier Archives and Special Collections.

TIPS FOR ARCHIVAL RESEARCH

- Archival research is slow research.
- Cyclical nature of archival research.
- Reach out to archives staff.
- Reading handwriting is a skill.
- Take lots of notes.
- Have fun!
