Context: scholarly conversation



What is it & what does it do?

- Review of the scholarly conversation
- Shows you know about your topic
- Demonstrates your skills in
 - locating key resources
 - critically appraising them
- Puts your work in context & justifies it
 - What has/hasn't been done
 - Key debates & perspectives
 - Identifies gap

Format & structure

GOOD	BAD
Thematic: Synthesizes into themes and patterns	Sequential: Annotated bibliography or list
Analysis: Critical evaluation	Description: Summary
Focused: Related to your question	Vague: On your general topic

Example: review article

Abstract

When and how do governments deliver public goods and services in response to citizen preferences? We review the current literature on government responsiveness, with a focus on public goods and service delivery in developing countries. We identify three types of actors that are commonly present in these accounts: politicians, bureaucrats, and citizens. Much of this literature examines interactions between dyads of these actors. The study of electoral accountability and constituency services emphasizes relationships between citizens (or voters) and politicians. Studies of bureaucratic incentives and political oversight of bureaucrats emphasize interactions between politicians and bureaucrats. Finally, studies of bureaucratic embeddedness and citizen oversight of bureaucrats elaborate the interactions between bureaucrats and citizens. We argue that an emerging literature that considers interactions between all three types of actors provides rich theoretical and empirical terrain for developing our understanding of responsiveness and accountability in low- and middle-income countries and beyond.



Topic/Research question

- Choose & focus your topic
- Create a research question
- Affects entire research project
- Can't do lit review before question

Literature search

- Search strategically
- Experiment
- Find commonly used terms & variations
- Example: Indigenous self-governance
 - Indigenous OR Aboriginal OR native
 - self-governance OR self-determination OR self-rule



Equal pay for female vs male politicians




How much is enough?

- Depends on your topic & requirements
- Selective: choose the best
- Include the key people/studies
- Use Works Cited/Bibliographies
- Stop when you keep seeing the same references

Track your sources

- Keep track as you go along
- Saves lots of time later
- Use a citation management/research organization tool

Zotero: organization tool



Analytical reading

- Read strategically:
 - How does this relate to my topic/question?
 - How is it useful?
 - What are the main findings, arguments, etc?
 - What is the theory & framework?
 - What are the strengths & weaknesses?
 - How does it relate to other studies?


Synthesis & Analysis

- Group into themes, patterns
- Code or annotate
- Think about:
 - Most significant findings, themes
 - What areas have researchers focused on (or not)?
 - What theories/methods are used?
 - Changes/developments over time?
 - Relationship to my research?

Synthesis strategies

- Note cards or sticky notes
- Searchable notes (e.g. Zotero)
 - Use controlled vocabulary
- Matrix/chart
- Concept map

Organize & write

- Provides rationale for your study
- How do you build on/depart from existing work?


